High court limits voting law

It ends need for U.S. OK to change elections in states with history of racial discrimination

In a 5-4 ruling on Tuesday, the Supreme Court declared Section 5 of the landmark Voting Rights Act — designed to speed minority voters — unconstitutional.

"Our country has changed and while any racial discrimination in voting is too much, Congress must ensure that the legislation it passes to remedy that problem speaks to current conditions," Chief Justice John Roberts wrote in the decision. He added that the coverage formula is



Section 4 was based on abominable statistics. Passed in 1965, the Voting Rights Act was a landmark civil rights law that required states with a history of voter suppression to get federal approval before they could change their election laws.

The project is now in the federal permitting stages, and

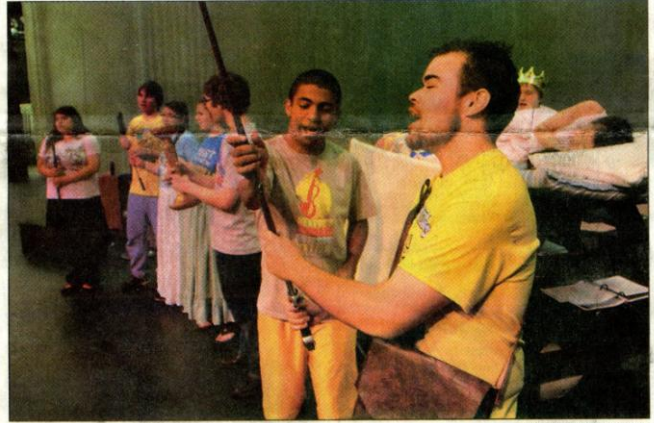
