Wizard and Justin Eaglin, the Scarecrow.

Eaglin, a 2013 graduate, is currently enrolled in college and majoring in electrical engineering.

"I'm not a vocal major though I spent four years in music and three in musical theater," Eaglin said. "College is stressful and I don't have a chance to sing. This (summer production) is fun and it's a way to get back in the community."

Seymour is no stranger to the stage either having taken classes in theater and theater production. His demeanor is quite opposite from the Cowardly Lion he portrays, he said with a laugh. Theater is in his blood and he plans to pursue a career that involves theater and music.

Roxane Gray, NHS theater director, Renee Kloes, NHS choral director and founding producing artistic director, and Kim Williams, former teacher director and also a founding producing artistic director, began working with the students and young adults less than three weeks ago.

"Casting was done at the end of the school year and includes not only our students in Nederland ISD but alumni as well," Gray said.

The group practices from 8 a.m. until about 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The cast is learning all aspects of the theater.

Sherer walked to the large basket where ropes were laid out to the sides and a cable attached to the top. The balloon and the mock-up of Dorothy's house were loaned by West Brook High School while other items such as costumes were loaned by All Saints Episcopal School and Beaumont Community Players.

Volunteers also came in to assist with the production including Lance Orta, a former student who has been involved with the Steve Barton Summer Musicals since its inception five years ago. Orta is currently enrolled in college out-of-state and came back to help with the sets, Gray added.
